



Dear Ms McIntyre,

I am writing on behalf of the 150 members of the Amateur Telescope Makers of Boston to acquaint you with issues that are raised by the Street Lighting portions of this rate case, in particular the apparent unwillingness of Massachusetts Utilities to maintain older incandescent "platter" fixtures, and the resulting bias toward High Pressure Sodium lamp conversion. This case includes provisions that encourage (some might even say coerce) towns to convert to these new fixtures, using the financial incentives of lower rates until conversion, as well as a declaration that the Utility will no longer replace any incandescent fixture. The alternative rate structure, where the town owns and maintains all of its own fixtures, is likely to be unacceptable to many cities and towns that already find it difficult to cope with the demands of school maintainance, Public Works tasks, etc.

Obviously, as amateur and professional astronomers, we are alarmed about the huge increase in wasted light spilling into the sky after the typical sodium conversion, as light pollution has made viewing the heavens much more difficult. Many of our members routinely drive large distances in search of "dark" skies. (Light Pollution is the term for the wasted light that escapes upwards from poorly designed fixtures as well as reflected light from excessive illumination levels; it's why city dwellers can't see many stars, and it has been getting progressively worse.) There is a tendency to assume

that the increased illumination resulting from lamp conversion gives greater safety, and that reduced energy consumption follows as well. Both assumptions can be shown to be questionable at best. The enclosed article from Science magazine includes a discussion of studies conducted by the FBI and lighting manufacturers trying to correlate crime rate with light level; results are far from conclusive.

The increased energy efficiency of HPS lights (roughly 4000 lumens for a 62 watt input vs 1000 lumens for a 95 watt incandescent bulb) is often offset by the installation of additional fixtures. The increased light output causes greater contrast between lit and unlit areas, so dark areas now seem much darker, and people complain that they don't see as well. Infiling with more light fixtures can then result in an eightfold increase in illumination, and 25% more energy consumption. There is increased glare from the brighter bulbs (unless they are very well shielded). Night driving is actually more hazardous, as eyes that have accomodated to the greater brightness can't see much of anything in unlit areas. This is especially acute among older people, but is a problem for anyone leaving an over-lit intersection or main street and driving down a side street. Light pollution isn't going to go away, but economic arguments shouldn't be used to justify wasteful overillumination. Continued maintainance of older light fixtures, using long-life bulbs (12000 hour bulbs should have an average three year life), will help to preserve the rural character of an area; if a fixture must be replaced, it can be replaced with a much lower wattage low pressure sodium bulb (even more efficient than HPS) in a well shielded fixture that puts the same illumination only where it is needed. What is at stake for us and many others is the night sky itself! Will our children only be able to see stars in a Planetarium?


EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

A meeting of the executive board was held at the clubhouse in Westford on Thursday January 26. The principal topics discussed were:



DEEP SKY WANDERINGS

This month's article is for the deep sky enthusiast who yearns for some 'hard to find' objects; ones that you sometimes can't see for all the glass at the University of Arizona. I have seen most of these objects on or around full moon, except for a few which were very difficult. This is by no means for the faint of heart; all you deep sky 'CAT' users should proceed to put down this article and leave the room. Those of you still out there should read on and prepare for adventure.

Our first stop is Cassieopeia and a faint region of emission nebulosity I first observed by the light of a nearly full moon. NGC 281, which I have termed the 'Pac Man' nebula, is faint at mag 11.0. It is 3.5' x 30' in diameter. Though just visible without a filter, it is best seen with a UHC or comparable nebular filter. I saw it with a 13" telescope. Next is the famous Horsehead Nebula in Orion, designated IC434 (Index Catalog), and B33 (Barnard's Nebula). This is the modifficult nebula I have seen to date. First there is This is the most the 'wall' of light, IC434, that stretches 60' south from Zeta Orionis. This is hard to see due to the light from Zeta, so it is best to move the star just out of the field of view. Now the Horsehead is the real challenge. To me it doesn't look like a horse's head, but more like an intersecting patch of darkness dividing IC434 in half. Once you realize this, seeing the Horsehead is that much easier. I strongly recommend the H-Beta filter and a lot of aperture. I have seen it about 11 times with the 13". There are no magnitudes listed but I estimate it at about 13.

East and North of Orion in the summer is Cygnus. A nebula grouping is centered near Gamma. I was not successful trying to view it from Westford, but it was a treat from the lovely dark skies of Katahdin! Of particular interest was NGC 6888, which really stood out with dark skies, aperture, and a UHC filter. It is mag 11, and a supernova remnant much like M1. Its calculated surface brightness is only mag 14, so large optics and red transmitting filters are a must. It is 18' x 12' and is southwest of Gamma Cygnus by 1.5-2 degrees.

Finally, an object that is as difficult as the Horsehead. The Cone Nebula, associated with NGC 2264, is tricky to view since it too is a dark nebula. It is just south of Phi Monocerotis, where an irregular variable gives the surrounding nebulosity its shine; the cone cuts off the light abruptly, is 5' long by 40" to 3' wide (cone shaped), and needs a large aperture, an H-Beta filter and patience to view! Our May meeting will feature the legendary John Dobson, the former monk who has dedicated his life to spreading his gospel of "Astronomy for Everyone." John organized the San Francisco Sidewalk Astronomers in the 1960's, bringing telescopes to the people rather than people to the "high temples" of professional observatories. In the process he revolutionized amateur astronomy by questioning cherished telescope design and construction concepts. It was his feeling that telescopes are for looking through, and that time spent actually building a telescope, while maybe not wasted, was time away from the joys of observing. Thus, by stripping telescope making to its bare essentials (what do you really need to make a useful instrument?), he developed what is now widely known as the Dobsonian telescope design. The ability to make telescopes with simple hand tools and cast off parts has resulted in an explosion of telescope making; now people who aren't experienced telescope nuts are able to quickly and inexpensively make a 6", 8" or larger telescope that easily disassembles to fit in a car, and the telescope nuts are now routinely making immense 16", 24" and 30" scopes that may be safely transported to such places as Stellafane. It should also be noted that he has made no effort to patent or control the use of his ideas, that being contrary to his "Astronomy for Everyone" philosophy; thus his name and design concepts are being used by various commercial firms without any financial reward to him or benefit to worthwhile astronomy programs. SEPTEMBER MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

During announcements at the September ATM meeting, Mike McCoy told us of the North Shore Astronomy club, which meets at the Ipswich River Sanctuary on Friday nights (when clear). Scott Milligan spoke of upcoming Learning Adventure sessions to be held at the clubhouse; members interested in getting involved should contact him. Dave Aucoin reported that the club raised approximately \$800.00 at the Stellafane swap table (remarkable considering the weather), and Gary Walker informed us of the upcoming donation of a large telescope. This telescope, a 12.5" Cave, is sound but in need of some restoration, so we're looking for volunteer help. Dave also announced that the annual ATM Picnic will be held at the clubhouse on Saturday, October 14 at 2:00 PM.

Our main speaker, Dr. Ursula Marvin of the SAO, whose talk was titled "Lunar Rocks Still Reflecting Light on the Moon", has been working with lunar samples for nearly 20 years. The oldest known earth rocks are 3.6 billion years old, while lunar rocks range from 3.1 to 4.6 billion years old, so very early geologic history can be traced only with these samples. In 1982, Dr. Marvin found a piece of lunar rock in Antarctica, and was recently able to determine that it was likely hurled out by the impact that formed the crater Copernicus. This rock and seven others like it are exact matches to lunar rock, and so are less expensive samples than those brought back by the Apollo astronauts (of course we needed to go there to be sure we knew what lunar rocks looked like)!

After the talk, and refreshments by Stelita Cronin, members who attended the Mt Katahdin dark sky trip showed slides.





OCTOBER MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

During announcements at the October ATM meeting, Scott Milligan said that the Learning Adventure session was to be rescheduled to November 18, that there would be a star party with the AMC on October 20, and that he was looking at Nantucket as a possible dark-sky trip site. There was a brief discussion of observing conditions there. Ted Kochanski said that an upcoming NOVA program on radar was partially filmed at Haystack. Dr. Owen Gingerich of Harvard spoke briefly of the possible restoration of the Great Refractor and its' building and exhibit space. They are in receipt of a \$78,000 matching grant from the Perkin Fund as well as an \$11,000 planning grant for exhibits from the Smithsonian; he will be in touch with the club if our help is needed. Dave Aucoin showed a completed model of the Voyager spacecraft and hopes to make a group purchase of card-stock models of Voyager and Gallileo (more information elsewhere). He told us that the 12.5° Cave telescope donated to the club recently needs lots of work, and then he read a letter from a disgruntled visitor who didn't feel he was very welcome at the clubhouse on several visits (unfortunately one of the visits was during a Learning Adventure session). He will try to contact the person directly. He also will be unable to run club meetings for the forseeable future due to work conflicts, so Marian Hochuli will fill in for him.

Our main speaker, Alan MacRobert of Sky and Telescope spoke of "What Might Have Happened Before the Big Bang"; how various pre-Big Bang inflationary universe theories were giving rise to rather fantastic mathematical scenarios of such things as alternate universes, as well as incredibly large distances and unimaginably small times. This is indeed a controversial topic which generated a lively discussion!



Our speaker will be J. Kelley Beatty, Senior Editor of <u>Sky and Telescope</u> magazine, whose topic will be "The Voyager Neptune Encounter". He will give us the latest results as well as an overview and eyewitness account of what it was like to be there as the news was breaking. Kelley joined Sky Publishing in 1974 and covers space exploration and the solar system. He recently has spent much time in the Soviet Union reporting on their space activities, and he also does freelance writing for other magazines and newspapers, including the <u>Boston Globe</u>.

NOVEMBER MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

At the November ATM meeting, Marion Hochuli filled in for President Dave Aucoin. After the usual reports she read excerpts from Digital's "Astronomy Net", an electronic bulletin board, where people described how they enjoyed the Digital astronomy group's visit to the Clubhouse, and she asked for interested people to sign up for a group purchase of the RASC handbook for 1990. Dave Aucoin had a signup sheet for a group purchase of Voyager models (please send him your check right away if you're interested- we're still a couple of people short of the minimum needed for the discount). Scott Milligan wishes to purchase a convex 17" Cervit blank previously donated to the club; the Executive Board agreed that it is unlikely that it would be used by the club given our other undertakings, and that funds received from such a purchase could help advance our other telescope projects. In order to properly value the disc, we obtained fair market valuations from some optical firms. These ranged from \$700 to \$1000. In other announcements, we learned of a grazing occultation occurring on December 18 in northern Massachusetts. Ed Wallner brought an Aurora Alert Network signup sheet; he's hoping to get the network working well by the time of solar maximum. Scott Milligan announced that the "Learning Adventure" sessions at the clubhouse would likely be held every three months or so (following the November 18 session), and that a preliminary system test of the 13" Schupmann optical system showed only minor corrections were needed. He also described a visit to Nantucket to check out observing conditions for a possible Dark Sky trip; it might be possible to have a joint educational venture with the Boy Scouts there, enabling us to use the only camping facility on the island. Off-season rates for other accomodations on the island look like high-season rates elsewhere! Gary Walker told us of a friend who owns a small island in Nova Scotia which might be available for a trip as well. He also has a few copies of the John Dobson books. Vladimir Vudler showed us a catalog of very warm (and expensive) outdoor clothing, as well as a video of the items after the meeting. We also heard that the MDC is planning to end all educational programs, including our public star parties at Ponkapoag Golf Course, due to a funding cut-back. Scott Milligan urged members to write to: M. Ilyas Bhatti, MDC Commissioner, 20 Somerset St, Boston, MA 02108, as well as to their local State Representative.

Bill Luzader, Taunton High School's planetarium director, spoke on the current state of astronomy education. He showed a video done by Project STAR, taken at the latest Harvard commencement, where graduates were asked some fundamental astronomy questions, followed by an exploration of where their misconceptions came from. This research showed that people have "naive" theories to explain such things as the seasons, and that they will try and fit what they hear in a classroom to these theories. Unless they are challenged, and asked to do activities that require them to learn, and then describe what they've learned, they are likely to only remember a few unconnected facts that they fit into the framework of their original theory. In other words, they don't gain any actual understanding. One of the Project STAR approaches is to work with scale models that the student builds; this gives them a feel for the scale of things, and lets them try to explain concepts to themselves in a way that textbook diagrams can't.
