The meeting was opened by Mario Motta. The Secretary's report was not given, Tony Costanzo gave the treasurer's report and Mark Bruckner gave an update on the club membership. John Reed reported that the clubhouse

kitchen is complete and that a the May 20th Star Party at the clubhouse went well.

Mario recognized outgoing Treasurer Tony Costanzo's nine years of hard work in fulfilling the obligations required of that position.

Astro Software Review...

GUIDE Ver. 3.0

IRIS Got me guide Ver. 2.0 for father's Day a few years ago. Now that I have upgraded my CPU to a '486 DX50 from a '486SX25, it's really a lot of fun. As a novice in both computers and astronomy. I have found this computer star chart easy to use, inexpensive and useful. The original software cost \$50.00, the version 3.0 upgrade was an additional \$20.00 (it is advertised in *Sky & Telescope* for \$70.00).

Guide comes with a floppy disk program, a CD library disk and a detailed manual. The performance is just as good with a single speed CD drive as it is with a double speed, but the CPU upgrade (which includes a math coprocessor) made zooming in and out and animation at high magnification a breeze.

Version 3.0 added colors to the display and some object catalogs to the already huge library (It turns out that our own Mario Motta was instrumental to making improvements on version 1.).

The features I especially like are changing the screen colors to red on black (for use at the telescope) and that the images can be flipped left to right and/or up and down to match the view in the eyepiece. Other features I enjoy are

animating the planets' movements from earth's perspective or from Halley's comet's perspective, watching lunar and solar eclipses and going 2000 years backwards or forwards in time.

Where in Space is Carmen San Diego

This is better than you may expect. My eleven-year-old son and I enjoy it and even I am learning a lot from it. David learned about the Martian moons Diemos and Phobos and now that's all he talks about. The animation of space creatures are funny and the photos of the solar system objects are lovely and contain clear explanations. The software includes a star chart and data base containing explanations of names, mythology, famous science fiction authors, space probes along with descriptions of solar system objects. It runs well on my PC with a Sound Blaster Pro sound card and comes on floppy disks. - Eric Reines

Membership Renewal...

HOW DO I Renew or Join?

Renewing or joining is easy. Find the ATMoB Renewal Form on the back page of this newsletter. Then fill out the membership information section, check off the boxes and total up the amounts. Write out a check (payable to "ATM's of Boston"), and you are done. Most members are Regular Members (full paying members). Senior Members are generally anyone who is retired (or over the age of 65) and Student Members are full time college, high school, middle or elementary school students (regardless of age).

Sky & Telescope Renewals

Sky & Telescope (S&T) affords club members a \$9.00 discount over it's regular subscription price of \$33.00. If you wish to continue your S&T subscription, send in the renewal card from S&T along with your club renewal form. Throw away the Sky Publishing envelope that comes with the card and ignore everything the front and back of the S&T card says except for the price and expiration date.

Do not send your card back to S&T (they will have to send it back to you). To renew S&T through the club, send your S&T subscription fee, your S&T card and your membership fee to the ATMoB Membership Secretary (Mark Bruckner). Lost your S&T card? Send in the order to the ATMoB without it, S&T will make do without it.

Astronomy and CCD Astronomy Renewals

These are both optional magazines. You do not have to send in any renewal cards tot the membership secretary. Just sign up and include the subscription amount in your check. *Astronomy* cost \$20.00 (\$6.95 discount) and *CCD Astronomy* costs \$20.00 (no discount).

Signing Up for Subscriptions

If you have a S&T form from an existing subscription, send it with the ATMoB renewal form and a check. Otherwise, just sign up.

Double Check Your Form

Some members love math and some hate it, so please double check your application and make sure you don't do things such as asking for *Sky & Telescope* without including your membership fee. In order to purchase optional magazines through the club you must be a current ATMoB member.
